




Precinct winners

The city fairly uniformly backed Brody most strongly, followed by Ahearn-Koch. Hyde came in second in one east Sarasota precinct he won in March, while Ahearn-Koch held on to one she won before, but also won a precinct carried by Hyde in the first election.

Voter Turnout

Turnout increased in both municipal runoffs this year. In Sarasota, the city saw the highest citywide turnout in more than 15 years. A special election in North Port broke 10 percent for the runoff.




Emrich picked up 623 new voters since March, more than Luke's additional 570, and he expanded his base to steal a couple precincts, but was unable to catch up with Luke's broad support.

Bullet Voting

Also called singleshot voting, this notes when voters elected not to use their second vote and support only on candidate. After having relatively few bullet votes in March, Ahearn-Koch led in bullets for the runoff. Hyde did almost as well, showing similar voter intensity.




Second Choices




Brody ultimately earned a record number of votes in both his opponents' camps. But there was also substantial party unity among the two registered Democrats in the race. The number of voters who cast votes for Brody and Ahearn-Koch exceeded the total number who cast either vote for Hyde.

Second Choices




As a reminder, Ahearn-Koch's cross-support in the March election overlapped primarily with voters who backed 4th- and 5th-place finishers Chapman and Atkins in March. The question of whether they would come out or stay home broke in Ahearn-Koch's favor.



AGE BREAKDOWN


Sarasota's youngest voting demo is growing in numbers but turnout remains low. Voters in their 60s and 70s dominate the participating electorate. Notably, voters in their 70s boast the best turnout in May elections.



AGE BREAKDOWN


An almost identical phenomenon can be seen in North Port. A special election suppressed turnout in all demographics, but older voters still turn out, and young voters do not.

Racial Makeup




In both municipalities, whites dominate the total makeup of the city, and participating electorate more so. Even an issue like Sanctuary Cities did nothing to shift Hispanic turnout.

Findings

- Brody proved the consensus candidate, showing wide overlap in support with both opponents on his way to a record-setting total.
- Jennifer Ahearn-Koch saw major growth in bullet voting, surpassing Hyde and Brody, proving a greater voter intensity than in March.
- Republicans in Sarasota saw a higher percentage turnout and retained more March voters, but Democrats still dominated in sheer numbers in the third straight Sarasota election where Democrats ran the tables.
- In North Port, Republican voters outnumbers and out performed, though no registered Republican ran in the special election. Independent Jill Luke did beat a registered Democrat.
- Women made up a greater portion of the electorate in May than March in both municipalities, with a sharp increase in Sarasota.
- Black and Hispanic voters turned out at less than half the rate of white voters in both cities. White voters in Sarasota had very high turnout.
- Voters in their 60s and 70s made up more than half the electorate participating in Sarasota. Voters in their 20s continue to grow as a portion of registered voters, but to perform poorly at polls.
