TANIA AND GABOR SAY EVERYTHING SEEMED PERFECT when they welcomed their child, Sophia, in 2012. But being far from their birth countries and speaking different languages presented some challenges as new parents. "When we had Sophia, we didn't know how hard it would be to raise a child without the support of relatives. We looked for help and were referred to Children First," said Tania. Once in the program, Sophia received speech and occupational therapy twice a week, and within a few months, there were major improvements in her behavior and language skills. Children First's wrap-around services for families helped Tania and Gabor too. "We were continuously surprised in the best way because Children First also helped parents with courses that allowed us to learn how to be the best parents we could be," said Tania. They took advantage of the Families First Institute, taking courses like Positive Solutions for Families, English as a Second Language, Calendar-Based Budgeting, and 5 Keys to Better Behavior. The courses helped them build their lives as they welcomed their second daughter, Gabriella. country, Children First empowers vulnerable children and families in our community each day. The exclusive Head Start and Early Head Start provider for Sarasota County offers full-day preschool, infant and toddler care, nutritious meals, health screenings, and family support services to at-risk children from birth to five yearsold. In addition to these wrap-around services, the agency's Families First Institute also offers free courses to the public on topics like parenting, budgeting, and career readiness to help families build better lives. More than 93% of families enrolled at Children First live at or below the federal poverty level and receive these services at no cost. While there is a waiting list, more than 700 children annually have the opportunity to reach their full potential.

oodwill Manasota is an industryleading, 501(c)(3), not-for-profit organization that changes lives through the power of work. With the sale of donated goods and

GOODWILL MANASOTA: CHANGING LIVES THROUGH THE POWER OF WORK Goodwill Manasota is proud to give individuals with barriers to employment – including those who have struggledwithaddiction, ex-offenders, individuals with disabilities, veterans, and senior citizens – a chance to change their lives through the power of work. Individuals like Suzanne Ottomanelli, Goodwill's 2018 Team Member of the Year.

Suzanne came from a loving family, earned her Masters of Education, and loved her job as a teacher. A seven-year marriage to someone who was into drugs changed everything. Influenced by her husband's behavior, she became addicted to cocaine and was eventually arrested. Over time, her connections to her family, her community, and her spiritual lifewere disrupted. She suffered two drug overdoses. While recovering in the hospital from the second one, her parents told her that her sister—who struggled with an addiction to prescription medication—had overdosed and died. It was then that Suzanne decided it was time to get her life back on track. She relocated to Bradenton, where she enrolled in Learn to Fish Recovery, a faith-based nonprofit residential recovery center. She drew on previous experience working at her father's businesses to seek employment as a cashier at Goodwill Manasota's corporate campus. Since Suzanne began her employment with Goodwill, she has excelled and been promoted to a store management position. She has received invaluable guidance and support, helping her to find her way back to financial and physical well-being, and regain her self-esteem. umane Society of Manatee County is a 501(c) 3 not-for-profit animal welfare organization that was originally formed in 1970, and today is regarded as the lead animal welfare agency in Manatee County. The Humane Society of Manatee County operates a shelter, the Second Chance Adoption Center located at 2515 14th Street W.

and a veterinary clinic / high volume spay and neuter clinic at 2415 14th Street W. in Bradenton. Each year the Second Chance Adoption Center rehomes more than 1000 dogs and cats through the adoption program. Many ofthe animals that enter the Second Chance Adoption Program are medically challenged or have behavioral issues. Each animal receives the highest quality medical care and behavioral training to complete the rehabilitation process to become adoptable. In September of 2015, Humane Society of Manatee County opened a 10,000 sq. foot state of the art veterinary clinic that included a high volume spay and neuter surgical suite. The veterinary clinic provides high quality, low-to-moderate cost veterinary carefor cats and dogs in Manatee County and neighboring counties.





PHILANTHROPY ABOUNDS IN MANATEE COUNTY AND SARASOTA COUNTY year after year as donors, supporters and the business community continue to support hundreds of area non-profits. This support has not only allowed the Humane Society of Manatee County to continue our life saving mission based work on behalf of the animals, but for an expansion of services. In addition to re-homing more than 1000 cats and dogs each year through our Second Chance Adoption Program, Humane Society of Manatee County's Pet Retention Program works to keep animal companions and their human families to gether. Pet retention programs include a cat and dog food pantry, behavioral training assistance and low-to-moderate cost veterinary services. The Humane Society of Manatee County recently participated in The Patterson Foundation's Margin & Mission Ignition initiative to implement earned income strategies through an expansion of veterinary services that strengthen mission impact. Our communities have a large financially challenged population who own animals and these families struggle to provide veterinary care for their animals. Humane Society of Manatee County continues to provide much needed low-to-moderate cost veterinary services and low cost / no cost spay and neuter surgeries, microchips and vaccines. FOR MORE THAN 20 YEARS THE For more than 20 years the South Florida Museum's Manatee Rehabilitation Aquarium has served as a Stage 2 Rehabilitation Facility for injured manatees; a place where injured and sick manatees come after their critical care needs have been met. Every manateethatisrehabilitatedhasastorytotell. Tannebaum's story begins last December. The young male manatee became entangled in a rope close to the mouth of the Caloosahatchee River near Ft. Myers and it nearly severed his tail. Residents had displayed a Christmas tree on a floating dock anchored with ropes, not realizing the lines might be dangerous for manatees. His wounds healed and Tannebaum was returned to the wild in early November with assistance from the Clearwater Marine Aquarium, SeaWorld Orlando and Florida's Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. The Museum has helped rehabilitate 36 manatees. Rescued manatees typically remain in the program from a few months to more than a year. The Museum is a founding member of the Manatee Rescue and Rehabilitation Partnership (MRP). Founded in 1998, MRP is a cooperative group of non-profit, private, state and federal entities that work together to monitor the health and survival of rehabilitated and released manatees. "We're excited for him to return to the wild," said Virginia Edmonds, the Museum's Aquarium Director. "This time of year manatees in the wild are feeding to prepare for winter, then moving towarm-water refuges. Tannebaum is ready to get out there and start filling up."



LOCAL YOUTH AND STATE COLLEGE OF FLORIDA, MANATEE-SARASOTA (SCF) STUDENTS have experienced the true spirit of giving from the State College of Florida Foundation. Students visit the Foundation of fices in times of need and rarely come away disappointed. Each year, the Foundation provides more than 1,000 scholarships to bright andtalentedstudents. The Foundation helps single mothers, veterans and first-generation colleges tudents, ensuring that financial concerns don't hamper their success. The individual impacts are tremendous, but so are the effects onthecommunity. SCFFoundation supports SCF's most talented musicians, those chosen for the presidential string and jazz combos. SCF Foundation also helps meet critical workforce needs in the region, by providing equipment for programs and student scholarships. Workforce programs include criminal justice, paralegal and legal assisting, early childhood education, technology management, biotechnology, nursing, dental hygiene, radiography and other healthcare professions. Instead, he works off a different calendar, one that commemorates the most meaningful dates in his life and those he shared with his late wife, Carol Ann, – birthdays, anniversaries, and career milestones. Instead of only sharing these grateful celebrations with a small group of friends, Lee wanted to extend them to people facing challenges in life. He decided to do so by donating to a worthwhile non-profit, but he didn't know which organization to choose. Having been acquainted with Kathryn Shea, CEO of The Florida Centerfor Early Childhood, Lee was invited to an appreciation gathering in downtown Sarasota. That evening, he sparked conversation with Kathryn, several Florida Centerstaff, and board members. Inspired by their passion in discussing the organization, he took a tour of the facility a few weeks later. As he watched teachers and therapists work with children at the center's Starfish Academy preschool, it settled any indecisivenes she had. Lee still does not necessarily respond to traditional donation requests, having made his own philanthropic plans, which include an estate gift for The Florida Centerfor Early Childhood among other charities close to his heart. But on certain days of the year, he hand-delivers a donation to the Florida Center. Gifts like this, from donors like Lee, allow non-profit organizations like the Florida Centerto keep making strides in furthering their missions every day.

USF SARASOTA-MANATEE STUDENT FRANCISCO LOERA was nearing the end of his studies this past spring when he was offered a four-month internship. A great opportunity, Loera and his wife nevertheless thought long and hard about whether it was worth the sacrifice of giving up his managerial job at a local retailer, which paid the couple's living expenses. In the end, they chose the internship. But it was only because of a USFSM scholarship that Loera was able to make that choice. Now he credits the scholarship for where he is today: teaching fifth grade at Palmetto Elementary School. It turns out, the school extended a job offer as a result of Loera's internship. "I wasn't sure about finances and going into a full-time four-month program where I would be working for free, but the scholarship provided a foundation for us," he says. A 2018 USFSM School of Education graduate, Loera is among dozens of students helped yearly by generous donors, who provide assistance for tuition, books, living expenses and other necessities. Additionally, most scholarship recipients are from the area and work in the community after graduation – meaning USFSM scholarships not only benefit students but local communities as well. That extends to Loera: The first-generation college student now teaches at the school he attended as a boy. "This is where I was first inspired to be a teacher, and now I'm teaching here. I couldn't have done this without the scholarship."
